Include a description of the adequacy of health care and other services, supports, and assistance that developmental disabilities receive 1) in ICF(MR)s; and 2) through home and community-based waivers.(limit 4,000 characters):</p> <p>Despite the challenges faced by the new Executive Director, the Council remains committed to ensuring the FY 2007-2011 State Plan is in compliance with the DD Act. GDDC maintains its organizational structure and the Council's business continues to be directed and supervised by three standing committees, organized to meet and serve topical areas linked to Areas of Emphasis specified by the DD Act. The Committees are:-Planning Committee, responsible for preparing, reviewing, and updating the Five-Year State Plan. Quality Assurance and Evaluation Committee, responsible to provide formative and summative review, monitoring, and evaluation of on-going projects funded by the Council. Legislative Committee, responsible for preparing testimonies and/or position statements for review and approval by the Executive Committee for submission to the Governor, the Legislature, and respective legislative Committees regarding fiscal or policy matters pertaining to persons with developmental disabilities. The Council provides the Executive Committee guidance and direction to ensure that the activities are in line with the State Plan. Additional Ad-hoc Sub-Committees were convened to address specific issues and activities. The Council continues to collaborate with our Tri-Agencies, government, and non-profit organizations in advocacy, system change, and capacity building to ensure individuals with disabilities have the information and resources to receive the services inclusively. An analysis made by management revealed that the State Plan was not achievable with the limited time and with the availability of funding. Some members are reluctant to change the State Plan, However, most members support the idea having to acknowledge the funding issue. There is a proposal to review and amend the State Plan to a more realistic and achievable plan and to submit to ADD on or before the August 2008 deadline.</p> <p><u>Economic, Social, and Environmental Issues:</u></p> <p>For the past year, Guam continually struggled to regain financial stability and to address the growing deficit as a result of various insufficient program funding, decline in tourism, downsizing and closure of the Naval Base. Guam continues to address the funding issues for the following: (1) Earned Income Tax Credit, (2) Cost of Living Allowance, (3) Guam Memorial</p>

Hospital (shortage of supplies and equipments), (4) Furlough/Reduction of Work Hours and (5) Closure of the Ordot Landfill. To address Guam's continued cash shortages, the Camacho-Cruz Administration developed and implemented the Fiscal Recovery and Deficit Elimination Plan. The Plan was developed to enhance revenues, reduce expenditures, budget management, and cash infusion. As a result of the plan, several government agencies raised fees to increase revenues and enforced government wide Austerity Measures to reduce expenditures. On July 13, 2007, Guam received federal reimbursement monies. The money was used to pay for outstanding/pending obligations. The plans to furlough thousands of government workers was cancelled as the Governor of Guam wanted to preserve government workers providing various public services most especially services catering to individuals with developmental or other disabilities.
