(Maximum 1,000 Characters): During the 2006 Family Supports Forum, representatives from various entities were given an opportunity to talk to individuals with disabilities and their families regarding various issues including housing. The Guam Housing and Urban Renewal Authority group discussed housing issues including the Fair Housing Act. They also discussed the First Time Homeowner's Program which is a program designed to assist qualified first time homeowners in purchasing or constructing new homes, who would not be able to qualify through the conventional programs due to income criteria. The Homeowner's Rehabilitation Loan Program is a program that assists homeowners who are individuals with disabilities, the elderly or those who fall below the median range to apply for grants that will assist them in bringing their homes into building compliance. It also provides the opportunities for homes to be retrofitted and made accessible particularly for individuals with disabilities and the elderly.</p>

During the forum, participants were able to obtain information on the various programs available for individuals with disabilities to assist them in owning their own homes especially those who would be first time homeowners. Consumers were able to hire family members as services providers and utilize funding from the grant to pay these individuals and also purchase services that they needed. This included the purchasing of needed assistive devices, medical supplies, personal assistant services, personal care/grooming, transportation and other needs.
